Rudy Tires of Dead End Jobs & Makes a U-Turn to a GED

Rudy Ubaldo isn't letting any grass grow beneath his feet. The first graduate of the GED Labs program at Multnomah County Library earned his GED and is now enrolled at Mt. Hood Community College. His motivations for completing the GED: being a role model for Alexi, his 11-year old daughter, and expanding his employment opportunities beyond dead end jobs.

Natives of Oaxaca, Mexico, Rudy's family immigrated to the U.S. in the 1980s. His parents worked long hours just for the family to survive, leading Rudy to feel he'd been abandoned. The family moved twelve times by the time Rudy got to high school. Rudy remembers physical abuse and anger towards his parents.

The U.S. fell far short of Rudy's expectations for a new life. By the time he was 11 years old, he was sneaking around, drinking with young adults. When Rudy immigrated, he spoke no English, was not literate in his own language, and didn't learn to read well. Rudy's mother was unable to go to school because she had to help her mother, and his father chose not to. Rudy continued to fall behind academically, had really poor attendance, and school became harder and harder. Not surprisingly, he dropped out of high school in the 10th or 11th grade.

So, what turned Rudy's life around? One factor was being turned down for a job he wanted because he had no diploma or GED. He's dealt with his addiction issues. He's improved his reading skills to the point where he now enjoys reading for pleasure. He has full custody of his daughter.

Rudy's turnaround gave him a sharp focus for his goals. He realizes that wanting isn't everything, and is confident that he can his achieve goals. The GED Labs were a good fit for Rudy; while he'd enrolled in ABE classes, he had difficulty processing the information. Through the GED Labs, he was able to direct his efforts, study effectively, and be successful on the GED tests.

In addition to his educational achievements, Rudy's family relationship are stronger than ever. He and his daughter live with his parents, who look after his daughter while he attends Mt. Hood Community College or works at his on-call job as a delivery driver for Multnomah County Library, a job that requires a GED. He's determined to give his daughter the experiences he didn't have and expects her to go to college.

Rudy also volunteers for Multnomah County Library, using his bilingual skills to reach out to others.

No grass is growing under Rudy Ubaldo's feet.

Editor's Note: When asked for advice for tutors, Rudy said to remember that people come from different backgrounds and experiences. He had to get over a lot of issues before he could get more out of life, have more energy, and prioritize goals. Rudy's experiences are a good reminder that adult learners move in-and-out of programs and often study on their own to improve their skills.

2-1-1 Info — While tutors aren't social workers, adult learners sometimes need the help of social services.

I've been tutoring a long-time immigrant whom I feel may be undernourished. A colleague reminded me about **2-1-1**, a telephone number that connects callers to human services in Oregon and Southwest Washington. One call to 2-1-1 I located three meal providers in the student's neighborhood, one with a work/meal barter system.

Call **2-1-1 in Washington County** and reach Community Action (Helping People, Changing Lives).

CASH Oregon — The 211 website has a referral for a toll-free phone number and website for free tax preparation assistance: 866-698-6158. The tax referral is provided in conjunction with **CASH** (Creating Assets, Savings and Hope) Oregon, a nonprofit committed to improving the financial health of low income working families and individuals.
