

Take Me Out to the Ballgame

If you walked by one ESOL classroom at PCC Southeast Center around the 4th of July this summer, you might have thought that Portland baseball was returning. You would have heard "Take Me Out to the Ball Game." If you had opened the classroom door, you would have caught a whiff of peanuts and Cracker Jacks. That's because volunteer tutor Fran Eichenauer was demonstrating American culture to her students through music, taste, and smell.

After Fran and her husband relocated from Colorado to Portland to be near children and grandchildren, she discovered tutoring at PCC Southeast Mercy Corps. She's tutored steadily since winter term 2011. A social worker by trade, her work with groups is a natural fit for a conversation class.

Using a variety of methods, Fran teaches her Level 2 and 3 students technical language skills including grammar, word structure, and pronunciation. Word bingo facilitates learning prefixes, suffixes, and difficult word sounds.

Scrabble tiles serve as building blocks for teaching spelling. For students with limited English vocabularies, Fran uses the white board and has students draw pictures of life in their home country. Fran writes the new words on the white board, and the student copies them. As their English skills increase, Fran has observed that her students become more comfortable conversing, learn to fit into their new surroundings, and begin to use their English skills for practical matters such as conversing with their children's teachers.

Fran's inspiration comes from her students who have much to teach about language and culture. While she prepares for each class, she doesn't hesitate to set

aside lesson plans to follow the students' interests. She finds that flexibility results in delightful surprises — one of her students is a well-known Salvadoran artist who helped paint the cupola ceiling of the National Museum in El Salvador.

Many students are exposed to American culture through cable TV. To the uninitiated, professional baseball games would be hard put to compete with action-filled shows such as "Cops." I'm willing to bet that if Fran's students were channel surfing and came upon a Seventh Inning Stretch and heard "Take Me Out to the Ball Game," they would join in and also recall the taste sensations of peanuts and Cracker Jacks. Ahhh — a positive recollection of American culture à la Fran Eichenauer.

What's In Your Tutor Toolbox?

Tutors, suppose you are tutoring a citizenship class and writing practice is on the day's agenda? This happened to your reviewer. When I noticed a "flashing aura of cognitive energy" swirling around the room and crashing, I flashed back to grade school and the punitive practice of staying in from recess to write "accommodate" 200 times on the blackboard (hardly an optimum technique).

I looked for answers at the ProLiteracy website, and I found them. I was reminded that if a particular sound is absent from one's first language, it will take a whole lot of "cognitive power" to hear it in another language. I watched a short video where a seasoned teacher helped students identify individual letters in words, and worked with students in groups and individually. I crafted a new plan to help my students learn to spell words targeted for the reading and writing portions of the immigration interview.

The training sessions at ProLiteracy present both theory and practice, which I think tutors will find very useful. The relatively short sessions include plenty of review to reinforce understanding of the techniques.

Thanks to Kathleen Holloway for suggesting ProLiteracy Education Network, with resources for instructors, students and organizations. Within the instructor section, links include techniques and strategies, lesson plans and activities, online courses, using technology, and literacy for social change. (The online courses formerly housed at Verizon/Thinkfinity are available here.)

This is a worthwhile resource for brushing up your tutoring skills while waiting for the 2012 Tutor Conference.
