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# Superman, Sherman and Me

In his essay, "The Joy of Reading and Writing: Superman and Me," Sherman Alexie describes his journey to become an author, teacher, and lover of books. As a Native American boy, he grew up in a community that discriminated against his culture, a community that expected him to be stupid. His peers made fun of him for reading, but his father, an avid reader, inspired him. My journey is similar in many ways. Education was not easy for me, and I was inspired by working with caring teachers and tutors, who showed me that, I too, could help others.

My journey began in Tualatin Elementary where teachers inspired me to overcome my challenges. Because I had a speech impediment, the school director assigned me to a speech therapist who worked with me on breaking down words and practicing sounds. My speech impediment made math difficult too. So, I worked with a math tutor, Mrs. Wells. She helped me to decode and comprehend word problems. She made math exciting.

Thanks to hard work and Mrs. Wells, I endeavored word problems and began to conquer my speech impediment, which led me to another tutor, a reading tutor named Ms. Helen. She read short stories with me and helped me sound out words. One of the things that I remember most was red licorice. When I excelled at reading, she rewarded me with it. As a result, I fell in love with reading.

While attending middle school and high school in Mollala, I struggled with epileptic seizures and with my eyesight. Doctors put me on epilepsy medication, which made it difficult to learn. I dropped out in the 9th grade when I broke my eyeglasses. Without eyeglasses, my "lazy eye" began to act up. It was then that my mother encouraged me to go to work. While working construction, I gained valuable real-life experience. From socializing with coworkers, I learned how important education is.

In 2010, I attended Portland Community College to get my GED. My teacher, Laurie Trybom, introduced me to Kay Talbot, the coordinator of the Volunteer Literacy Tutoring program. Kay connected me with Peggy Gordon. We worked through a GED history book and a vocabulary building book. We talked about government and history. I enjoyed reading about history and talking about it with Peggy. We shared a lot of good times. She showed me how much influence a tutor can have on others.

As I finished my GED testing, I went to see my exteacher, Laurie Trybom. She asked me if I would read with a new student named Tim. I am currently tutoring Tim on basic reading skills. We focus on phonics and breaking down words. My main goal is to give back to Tim what other tutors have given to me.

Sherman Alexie's journey was inspired by his father's passion for reading. Today he inspires others to read and learn. My journey was inspired by tutors, teachers, and coworkers who passed down knowledge to make my future brighter. I, too, hope to pass that inspiration along to others.

This monthly feature will focus on resources for tutors and learners. We will be checking in with VLT coordinators and other adult literacy practitioners and advocates each issue.

Goodwill Community Foundation International (GCF)

This delightful website is a virtual gold mine. Learners can access interactive videos and other learning tools for everyday activities. They have access to Email, math, job development, money, careers, reading, Internet basics, and numerous other topics. The computer section includes the array of Microsoft Office products.

I looked at mixing a recipe, baking a cake, getting to a job interview, and matching vocabulary words with images. Learners can choose both video and written instructions. I found that baking a cake required some precision with the mouse to select temperature and time; it was a good how-to exercise. Locating the bus route for the job interview required trial and error to choose a bus map. I recommend tutors preview lessons so they can help their students. The background music and narrative asides nicely complement the video.
