Foundational Literacy Spotlight: Update

Portland Literacy's Foundational Literacy Tutoring Program is up and running. We began matching tutors and learners in late December and tutors began working with individuals in late January. Four tutors are currently working with adult learners ranging in age from 19 – 62 years. Two of our learners have past experience with the Orton-Gillingham approach to reading instruction, while two others did not.

The long-term goal of the foundational literacy tutoring program is to build a group of specialized tutors to help pre-literate/low-literacy native-English speakers improve their literacy skills. Volunteers received an accelerated course on the elements of reading, building from individual letters to the sounds the letters represent, blending sounds into words, and segmenting words into sentences and paragraphs.



Ten volunteers participated in 21.5 hours of training, including 17.5 hours of literacy skills training, and four hours of workshops on working with adult learners and learning about trauma-informed practices.

Tangela Purdom and David Roth, local supporters of arts and education are funding this pilot project and will provide additional funding to train more volunteer tutors. Our efforts are also supported by the Language and Literacy Fund, who provided our training and assessments of participants' literacy skills, and who acted as a sounding board for PLC programs and tutors. The Blosser Center for Dyslexia Resources has also assisted our efforts.

While still in its infancy, we believe there is a strong need for teaching foundational literacy skills to adults and we are looking forward to serving more learners in the

Invention of Hangul, the Korean Script
It's weird to think about a script being
"invented," but that's exactly what happened
with Hangul. Koreans had historically used
the Chinese script, which many of us know is
difficult and time consuming to master. This
meant that only wealthy men were literate in
the past.

King Sejong was, and still is, widely beloved for his love of scientific progress, generosity, and passion for education. Despite his advisors' protests, he allowed the children of commoners to attend school.

Sejong knew that knowledge passes through the written word. He set to work on improving literacy rates of everyone in his kingdom, no matter their class. Historians suggest that he may have spent anywhere from two to seven years working on the invention of a phonetic script, all in secret except for his team of scientific advisors.

In 1446, King Sejong published a book introducing Hangul to his people. Although there was no systemic literacy tracking at the time, historical accounts suggest that Hangul significantly improved literacy rates among commoners, an impressive feat to achieve in the 15th century.

Sentenced (2023)

Produced and narrated by Steph Curry (yes, that one), "Sentenced" follows four adults who never learned to read, highlighting how illiteracy affects individuals and their families across multiple generations. This powerful documentary reminds us of the importance of early childhood literacy efforts and inspires us to take action, a must-watch for those who believe in the power of education and change.
